LETTER FROM THE CEO

Hello and Welcome to Wolverine Human Services!

Since 1987, Wolverine Human Services has become the largest child welfare agency providing treatment services to children and families of Michigan. Our Founder, Robert E. Wollack, MSW, began Wolverine after working in a variety of settings. Through his research and experience, Robert developed a treatment model which he believed would provide the best possible outcomes. After opening the flagship program on February 4, 1987, St. Jude's Home for Boys, Wolverine has grown significantly and has developed a vast array of treatment programs.

We currently have 19 different Treatment Programs at six sites, and four foster care and adoption offices. Our Residential Treatment Programs include Secure and Non Secure facilities for both males and females in Residential Foster Care, the Juvenile Justice system, and those in need of treatment for Behavioral Health and Substance Abuse. Our Community Based Programs include Foster Care, Adoption, and Teen Support Services. We are a state wide agency having served children from all 83 counties in Michigan. We also now provide secured treatment to children from other states throughout the country.

We have achieved our success by being flexible and taking calculated risks. We have been asked over the years by the Department of Health and Human Services and counties to develop programs to meet the ever changing and growing needs of your youth in crisis. And we have been able to accomplish that.

Our latest challenge was to incorporate Evidence Based Treatment Practices to meet the needs of youth who have experienced trauma and are diagnosed with Behavioral Health Disorders. Partnering with the Beck Institute for Cognitive Behavioral Therapy and Indiana University, we are finishing a five year project, being the first residential agency to integrate the model into our treatment setting with fidelity and integrity. All staff, from cooks to therapists, are CBT competent in core skills to create a true CBT embedded residential program. This is the first of its kind and we aren't just saying we practice these skills, we are applying these skills every single day.

In the field of child welfare, things are always changing. At Wolverine Human Services, we want to be the model for the change that is to come. We are truly dedicated to our children and their families, and are always striving to be the very best we can be. By dedicating ourselves to the needs of any child and any parent at any time, we truly are Helping Children to be Victors!

THE WOLVERINE DIFFERENCE

With the ever-increasing demand for mental health treatment for youth, Wolverine Human Services seeks to provide our clients with safety and security throughout our facilities. With 19 different Treatment Programs across the state of Michigan, Wolverine Human Services is dedicated to revolutionizing the Juvenile Justice treatment process. Though there are other facilities across the country dedicated to serving this population, there are many reasons WHS stands out among the rest. We call this **The Wolverine Difference**.

Over the past several years, Wolverine Human Services quickly became a trailblazer in the Juvenile Justice and Child Welfare communities due to our accreditation in Cognitive Behavioral Therapy for all staff members, the implementation of the Noble Child Salesforce system, and our Continuum of Care.

Through these advancements, we have been able to increase our success rates with clients, decrease the restraints needed during care, collect data so we can make evidence-based and informed decisions, and create individualized plans for children that meet their needs, no matter where they are in the Child Welfare system.

Additionally, we provide family therapy and counseling services with a Master's Level Therapist. All staff are Level 1 Competent or above in Cognitive Behavioral Therapy through The Beck Institute. Wolverine Human Services offers free transportation to any of our residential facilities for our clients and there is a Permanency Specialist/Family Worker assigned to each youth's family to provide in-home services and post-placement support.





COGNITIVE BEHAVIORAL THERAPY AT WOLVERINE HUMAN SERVICES

Wolverine Human Services (WHS) is a youth residential treatment facility in Michigan. In 2012, WHS began observing an increase in youth mental health problems. To address this issue, administrators sought out evidence-based practices (EBP) that would align with and enhance their current treatment offerings. After careful review of the numerous EBPs available, administrators chose Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT) given its potential to be implemented with fidelity by all staff (regardless of education level) and clinical team members. CBT aims to teach the client skills to recognize and influence the interaction between thoughts, feelings, and behaviors.

Once the blueprint was established, WHS refined and adapted CBT to focus on six unique “core skills,” which are CBT strategies that are accessible to staff and youth, regardless of education levels, and they are transdiagnostic in nature (i.e., relevant to all client presentations). The CBT core skills include: active listening, mood monitoring and intervention mapping (SPEED Maps), problem-solving (ITCH), behavioral activation (CAPES), distress tolerance (TIP), and cognitive restructuring (CBT Chat Forms).

Active listening is a skill that promotes effective communication and allows youth to feel validated and understood. SPEED Maps are used to self-monitor excess energy and distress levels. SPEED Maps allow youth to identify individualized thoughts, feelings, physiological sensations, and behaviors associated with effective communication and allows youth to feel validated and understood. SPEED Maps are used to self-monitor excess energy and distress levels. SPEED Maps allow youth to identify individualized thoughts, emotions, behaviors, and physiological sensations associated with different SPEEDs and then determine which core skills they should use based on their SPEED level. ITCH is a technique to effectively problem solve, allowing youth to think of solutions and evaluate the consequences of their solutions in a structured manner. CAPES is a method of behavioral activation that can decrease and prevent depressive symptoms in youth and promote daily structure. TIP is used as distress tolerance strategies to cope with moments of excess energy or high distress. Lastly, CBT chat forms are used as a technique to help youth use cognitive restructuring to catch, check, and change thoughts.

Over the past 5 years, WHS has seen a significant change in culture, as evidenced by significant changes in contextual factors that are assessed annually with quantitative surveys conducted by the research team. A Staff Member’s approach to treatment has been transformed by CBT with the first line of intervention being active listening. PQI assessments reveal that WHS has also identified a large reduction in physical restraints since the program’s initial development; restraints are at the lowest rates in WHS history.

WHS continues on-site trainings with content providing continuing education credits to clinical staff. Trauma trainings are provided for all staff and educational groups are provided for clients on a regular basis. WHS has also implemented a caregiver handbook to continue education into the homes of our clients, providing them with a language overview of the CBT model, and some practical skills and concepts. All residents are offered skill building family therapy sessions with their parents/ caregivers, using the CBT model to improve outcomes in the community.

Staff are trained and tested on CBT competency with our three-level staff endorsement system and role play techniques. CBT is integrated in all that we do, including staff meetings, job descriptions, and performance evaluations to provide better quality services to everyone that we serve.



KEY CBT INFORMATION

To address the increase in mental health needs, WHS adapted Cognitive Behavioral Therapy into our programs.

CBT aims to teach clients skills to recognize and influence interactions between thoughts, feelings, and behaviors.

WHS STAFF AND CLIENTS UTILIZE SIX UNIQUE CBT SKILLS:

- **ACTIVE LISTENING**
- **ITCH** - Problem solving
- **SPEED MAPS** - Mood monitoring and intervention mapping
- **CAPES** - Behavioral activation
- **TIP** - Distress tolerance
- **CBT CHAT FORM** - Cognitive restructuring

All Staff are trained and tested on CBT competency, with our three-level staff endorsement system.

From the executive team to our line staff, this allows for consistency in our treatment services and practices.

Continued use of CBT in our programs has our restraint rates at their lowest in WHS history.


NOBLE CHILD SALESFORCE SYSTEM

MELISSA AGULIAR

At the age of 16, Melissa Aguliar voluntarily entered the Vassar House Passages program to deal with substance abuse. Although she was only in this program for 7 months, Melissa is consistently praised among staff to this day. "Melissa has grown leaps and bounds in many areas. She continues her success from the treatment and relationships she established at Vassar House as it helped her to build a good foundation on which to make positive changes in her life."

While in our care, Melissa admitted that the most difficult aspect of being at WHS was dealing with drama and continuing to focus despite it. However, Melissa was determined to succeed in her program and is grateful to all of those who helped along the way. "You guys helped me graduate, I graduated early even though I was behind in school when I entered the program. I thought the therapy really helped because I used to be so numb and I didn't feel any emotions. My counselors and I worked through this and I started having goals."

After leaving Wolverine Human Services, we helped Melissa join the Job Core and complete a training in culinary arts. Melissa is working full time at Burger King training to be a manager. She is planning on attending GRCC this fall for Culinary Arts and Veterinarian Tech. She hopes to someday own her own restaurant where she can truly express herself through cooking. Melissa continues to work on sobriety. She attends NA meetings around her work schedule and is living at Destiney House which is an Independent Living home for girls 17-21 who are aging out of foster care. Melissa has established some great relationships with the other girls in the home and the house mother. Melissa often mentors the other girls and is always willing to be a safety partner for them.

If she could give advice to other girls currently in our programs, "I would tell them to hang in there, you will get through it. Focus on your future, not the now. When you focus on the now, it feels like the whole world stops. I know it's hard because I went through it. You can't see your friends, can't use your phone, but when you get out you'll be better if you take that stuff in!"



KENNETH ISAACSON

Kenneth Isaacson has been in the care of Wolverine Human Services 3 times. He was a resident at the Wolverine Center twice and more recently was a client in the Wolverine Growth & Recovery Center. Kenneth admits, transitioning was always hard. “The first time I came to Wolverine Human Services, I had no idea where I was going or what was happening... being away from friends, family, and home is scary for anyone.”

Kenneth was nominated for The Victor’s Award by his former Tuscola ISD teacher, Foster Findlay III, and he happily accepted. Foster wrote: “during our running club, he challenged his limits daily during the workouts. His ability was actually quite limited at first, but he improved his cardiovascular system greatly in a few weeks. Within a month, he could run four miles without a problem. Not only did he improve his work capacity, but he also learned how to lead and encourage others who fell behind.”

According to Kenneth, the greatest thing he learned while in our care was to use his time wisely. “Staying motivated can be difficult because you feel like you might never leave!” It is important to pick up an additional hobby, preferably something that betters yourself. Kenneth chose to learn French while in WHS care because of the impact it would have on his resume. “Teaching yourself something new is the best way to stay out of trouble- nobody taught me -but I learned. Plus, I have continued this since leaving Wolverine Human Services.”

Now, Kenneth is preparing to finish up high school while being dual enrolled at Kellogg Community College for EMT school. This fall, he plans to attend Kalamazoo Valley to study EMT and Paramedics as well as Fire Science and the Fire Academy. Kenneth works part-time at Taco Bell and is known as the Kid Santa of Albion from when he spent part of his savings along with donations to purchase \$400 worth of gifts for needy families and kids in hospitals or shelters.

In the future, Kenneth hopes to become a US citizen, work as a Paramedic/Firefighter in an urban area like Detroit or Grand Rapids, and be considered a Success Story for other kids in similar situations to be inspired by.

The best advice Kenneth would like to give clients in our care is to “preoccupy yourself in ways to better yourself. Learn something to put on your resume so you can get a job. Dream big and think about your future. You should go to a trade school or get a higher education so you don’t have to work in fast food for the rest of your life. Work on the problems that got you to WHS. If you avoid them, it’s like double time when you come back. Also, stand out. You are not meant to fit in, standing out is more important.”

CAMPUS OVERVIEWS

DETROIT CAMPUS

Located on the east side of Detroit, The Wolverine Center houses 5 non-secure male treatment programs for clients ages 12-17. The Wolverine Center offers programming for Juvenile Justice, Residential Foster Care, and Substance Abuse. These clients receive off-site educational programming and have access to the John S. Vitale Community Center and other outdoor recreation areas.



VASSAR CAMPUS

In the small town of Vassar, Wolverine Human Services offers 10 non-secure treatment programs for male and female clients ages 12-17. These services include programming for Juvenile Justice, Residential Foster Care, Behavioral Health, and Substance Abuse. These clients have highly structured classrooms provided through our partnership with Tuscola County ISD and Vassar Public Schools and have regular access to a fully equipped gymnasium and work out facility.



SAGINAW CAMPUS

To offer the greatest support, WHS established a state-of-the-art secure treatment facility, Wolverine Secure Treatment Center (WSTC), for both male and female clients ages 12-17. Treatment services and case planning are gender-specific and based on individual assessments. Clients are housed in a caring, yet strict environment, providing them the comfort and discipline they need to achieve their best results. All sleeping rooms are fully locked, and perimeter fencing and audio/visual surveillance systems ensure the safety of our clients. Our WSTC clients work in highly structured classrooms (maximum class size of 10 clients) provided by the Wolverine Secure Education Center and have regular access to a fully equipped gymnasium and work out facility.

Program Mission

The Wolverine Center for Addition Recovery & Education Intensive program (WCARE-I) is committed to facilitating adolescent recovery from both substance use and mental health disorders to improve personal, family, and community functioning.

Program Description

- Non-secure, residential substance use treatment for male and female clients ages 12-17
- Short term clinically managed medium-high intensity residential treatment- ASAM Level III.5
- Co-occurring recovery services to clients diagnosed with mild to moderate mental health and substance use disorders
- Council on Accreditation (COA) accredited in best practices for Substance Use treatment (SA), Residential Treatment services (RTX), and Juvenile Justice Residential (JJR)
- Licensed for Integrated & Residential Substance Abuse treatment from the Michigan Department of Community Health, Bureau of Health Systems
- 1:7 waking hours staff ratio and 1:14 sleeping hours staff ratio

Eligibility

- Male or female adolescents ages 12-17
- Clients diagnosed with Substance Use and co-occurring mental health disorders
- Clients served by Wayne County Care Management Organizations
- Clients made Temporary Court Wards
- Clients with special education certifications of emotionally impaired, learning disabled or, on a case-by-case basis, educationally mentally impaired
- Clients whose intelligence quotient is 70 or higher
- Clients with a security level indicating non-secure placement appropriate

Course of Programming

Each client's course of program is individualized to her/his needs. The following offers a general overview of a "full" course of the treatment program:



WOLVERINE CENTER FOR ADDICTION RECOVERY & EDUCATION INTENSIVE (WCARE-I) CLARENCE FISCHER CENTER VASSAR, MI

Behavioral Stabilization Phase:

This phase is recommended as a period of emotional, physical and chemical stabilization. Clients receive intensive needs assessments (developed for WHS clients by the Beck Institute) upon admission to inform treatment planning. This phase offers opportunity for clients to orient to treatment processes, acclimate to recovery concepts, and address pre-contemplation issues: including denial, delinquency, opposition, defiance, anger, and withdrawal. Clients are often Pre-contemplation and Contemplation Stage at this time.

Treatment Phase:

Intensive interventions occur related to substance abuse/dependence and mental health recovery. Clients actively engage in 3 hours of daily recovery-oriented group counseling. Clients engage in a rigorous therapeutic schedule, including family intervention, family psycho-education, and 12 Step work. Clients are generally in the Contemplation, Preparation and Action Stage at this time.

Reintegration Phase:

Clients have actively progressed into the Action and Maintenance Stage as she/he begins to prepare for reintegration into the community. Clients focus on development of a safety and relapse prevention plan, establishing concrete aftercare/step-down appointments, engaging in weekend home visits, community attendance at AA/NA, and academic enrollment in her/his community.

Program Services & Interventions

Evidence Based Interventions: Cognitive Behavioral Therapy, Motivational Interviewing, Motivational Incentives, Twelve Steps of Recovery, Trauma Informed treatment, Integrated Dual Diagnosis Treatment.

Interventions Provided (minimum of 16 formal hours weekly): Substance Abuse and Mental Health Recovery Didactics, Anger Management, Group Therapy, Individual Counseling, client and family psychoeducation, peer support groups, family intervention, Relapse Prevention Planning, academic services, medical/dental services, complete on-site psychiatric and psychological services.

Program Mission

The Wolverine Center for Addiction Recovery & Education program (WCARE) is committed to facilitating adolescent recovery from substance use and mental health disorders to improve personal, family, and community functioning.

Program Description

- Secure treatment for male clients ages 12-17
- Medium to long-term clinically managed residential treatment - ASAM Level III.0
- Integrated recovery services to clients with mild to moderate mental health disorders and mild to severe substance use disorders
- Council on Accreditation (COA) accredited in best practices for Substance Use treatment (SA), Residential Treatment services (RTX), and Juvenile Justice Residential (JJR)
